SUBMARINE HISTORY

GO VISIT A SUBMARINE MUSEUM

We are lucky to have a museum dedicated to the first commissioned nuclear power ship in the United States right here in Groton, CT. The NAUTILUS was decommissioned on March 3, 1980 after a career spanning 25 years and over half a million miles steamed.

Did you know there are currently twenty-five different submarine museums in the United States that you can explore? Eight of the twenty-five boats were built with pride right here at EB. Most are decommissioned, retired submarines, saved from being scrapped after being deemed unfit for further military service to the Navy.

Many of them saw action during World War II or played a role in the Cold War and/or Vietnam. Some were used for training, experimenting, or research for the development of today's submarine force. Each museum submarine is unique in her own way. Many hold various records, some were used in movies, and a few have rare operational, functioning equipment.

Thank you mentors and all others that make this program so successful!!!






Congressman Joe Courtney issued the following statement after Electric Boat workers, part of the Marine Draftsmen's Association (MDA-UAW) overwhelmingly agreed to a new five-year union contract.

"Ratification of a historic five-year contract in a landslide vote required a lot of intense advocacy and dialogue between the roughly 2,500 MDA-UAW Local 571 members and Electric Boat management. The record contract signals that these employees are respected and valued – which will achieve the urgent goal of robust hiring and retention. It also highlights that the workload of the designers will endure in the coming years given the strong demand for submarines by the U.S. Navy and Congress. This "reset" of the wage structure for this unique workforce is exactly what Congress intended last December with special funding for the submarine industrial base.

Rep. Courtney secured the authority in the FY25 National Defense Authorization Act for the Secretary of the Navy to increase wages for non-executive shipyard workers. In April, Rep. Courtney called on the Secretary of the Navy to exercise the new authorities and funding to deliver the wage increases Congress and the Navy agree are urgently required. On April 30, the Navy acted on its new authority and awarded General Dynamics Electric Boat a \$12.4 billion for the construction of two Virginia class boats, productivity improvements at shipyards, and workforce support at nuclear-powered vessel programs.

In addition to the new MDA Local 571 contract, the special funding from Congress enabled pay raises for two additional
