



THE PURITAN

John G. Alden was a renowned naval architect who was best known for designing schooners influenced by fishing vessel technology at that time. Alden was known as a high-end yacht designer. In 1929, Alden would design one of the most famous sailing vessels of his career, the Puritan. She would be one of the largest schooners he would design and offer a luxurious interior floor plan. This design was known as No. 0435B.

Alden initially secured funding for the Puritan from Samuel P. Curtis,a Philadelphia



The Puritan is in service as a charter vessel and still sails to this day. The Puritan reinforces EB's dedication to quality and our ship building excellence.

The scarcity of submarine building due to the end of WW I, and the stock market collapse had added to a quiet lull at the EB yard. Then on August 12, 1930, Brown signed a contact with EB to build the Puritan, and within a month her keel was laid. Required building techniques would make EB the builder of choice for Alden's new schooner design. The Puritan would require similiar craftmanship skills already employed in the yard to build submarines. Her steel hull construction would be a mix of butt-welded and lapped seams, and required high specification steel. The Puritan would be built to stand the test of time and withstand high pressures and rough seas.

On April 25, 1931, Edward Brown's daughter; Barbara Gray, would christen her bow. The Puritan was the only pleasure boat built by the EB during that time period. The ship made its maiden voyage from New London, Connecticut to Oyster Bay.

The MDA-UAW Local 571 is pleased to announce the availability of eight (8) annual John F. Saffomilla and E. Roy Colville Scholarship Awards of \$2,500.00 each to graduating high school seniors, pursuing a higher education, who meet the qualifying guidelines.

Eligibility to apply for these scholarship awards is limited to graduating high school seniors whose parent, grand parent, or legal guardian is a Local 571 member in good standing. Applications for the scholarship awards for 2023 are available from your Grievance Representative or click HERE

Each student applicant's high school academic and social achievments are the most important considerations in choosing the winners; however, it should be noted that in the selection process a significant emphasis and/or tie breaker factor will be placed on the financial need of the students.

Student applicants should take care to provide all the information requested of them on the application form. Additionally, they should check with their high school guidance departments in sufficient time prior to the deadline to ensure that their school has forwarded the required data to our scholarship committee. The deadline for the return of application forms and supporting data from school guidance departments is Friday, April 28, 2023 and this is firm.

The following guidelines will prevail in selecting the recipients and awarding the scholarships:

All applications must be received by mail only, at the MDA-UAW Local 571 Office, P. O. Box 7275, Groton, CT 06340 Attn: Recording Secretary, no later than Friday, April 28, 2023.

All timely applications will be reviewed and eight recipients will be selected by an impartial panel of judges non-associated with MDA Union. Incomplete or late applications will not be processed.

No hand-carried applications will be accepted.

The scholarship awards will consist of eight awards of two thousand, five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) each.

One (1) runner-up will be selected by the impartial committee in the event one of the winners becomes disqualified.

AFL-CIO SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY CONTEST 2023 WORKERS MEMORIAL DAY

Each year during Workers Memorial Day ceremonies on April 28th, workers, legislators, members of organized labor unions, worker advocates and others gather to honor the memory of those workers who have lost their lives because of workplace injuries or illnesses. The ceremonies highlight the sacrifices made by these workers and of the families left behind and inspire us all to work harder on behalf of the welfare of all workers.

This year the Connecticut AFL-CIO Health and Safety
Committee, as part of its efforts to "mourn the dead but fight
like hell for the living", is offering a scholarship essay contest
to inspire high school seniors to think about the importance of
workplace health and safety, of the consequences that arise when
workers are forced to toil in unsafe working conditions and of the
role that organized labor has played in protecting workers both in
the past and present.

In this year's scholarship essay contest, Connecticut high school seniors are asked to respond in 1,000 words or less to ONE of three questions with serious thought, some research (with cited sources), and, most importantly, awareness of the true cost of workplace hazards on the lives of workers.

1st Prize is \$1,500 2nd Prize is \$1,000 3rd Prize is \$500

All entries will be judged anonymously on content, originality and clarity of vision. The winners of this contest will be asked to share a portion of their essay during our 2023 Workers Memorial Day event on Friday, April 28, 2023, at 12 pm, at the Bushnell Park Workers Memorial.


